A Word from Pastor Tim:

"But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, Though you are little among the thousands of Judah, Yet out of you shall come forth to Me The One to be Ruler in Israel, Whose goings forth are from of old, From everlasting." Micah 5:2

For more than a thousand years, Israel was looking forward expecting a messiah to come, a savior to be born. They looked forward to his coming not really knowing what to expect or what he would be like. Every year at Advent, we look forward to Christmas re-anticipating the coming of Christ. The biggest difference is that we know much more about what we're expecting than they did.

This year I am inviting you on an advent journey with the church. Normally, we re-anticipate the birth of the Christ child by focusing on his divinity. This year, I'm going to ask that we break the tradition, and look forward with expectation while focusing on his humanity. During our time together this season we will look at ways in which Jesus comes to us in a package with which we can relate. We will look at how similar our background is to his.

First, Jesus comes to us from a people. Not a perfect people but flawed in every way. A people that struggle with their neighbors, with each other, and even with God. Many people are ashamed of the ways in which they struggle with God or their understanding of him. Perhaps it is that very struggle that God can use the most to get our attention.

Secondly, Jesus comes to us from a place. A small, obscure, hidden, powerless place. Do you come from a place of powerlessness? Is that how you often feel in life? If God can change all of eternity with someone that comes from such a place, what might he be able to do with your life if you allow him?

Lastly, Jesus comes to us from a story. Jesus comes to us as, simultaneously, the fulfillment, the culmination, the renewing, and the continuation of the greatest love story ever told. And he is inviting you and I to recognize our role as recipient in this story.

I hope you will engage in this advent journey with me. I hope you will devote yourself to reading the book, *Roots*, in your homes and as a family. I hope you'll join me here reach week. I hope you make your way here on Christmas Eve for our candlelight service. And even though that will conclude advent, it would be crazy to walk forward with all that expectation and then not be here Christmas morning! I pray that we will all be here, and it will be a celebration of our Lord and Savior like none before it!



Get your Advent devotional book and join us in walking this journey of expectation together. It is not too late!

The movie follows his antics as he stays strong and only has passing moments of missing his family. But in each movie, he meets someone that is alone all year long. And through that relationship he gets to see just how blessed he is to have family and those that care for him.

Maybe you have a neighbor like Kevin does. Someone whose family doesn't visit much, someone who spends a lot of time by themselves. Maybe they're elderly, maybe sick, maybe their family doesn't live locally. maybe they do have family around that care for them, but during the holiday season, that family is extra busy, and they are left alone more.

Maybe it's someone you meet in the park. Maybe at first, they seem a little scary, and you don't want to get too close. But that is exactly what Jesus asks us to do. To step into their world and remind them they are not alone.

Will you do that this year? When you gather for Christmas dinner or your other celebrations, will you invite someone that doesn't have another place to go? Will you take special care to make sure they know you are inviting them as a friend, not a charity case? Will you pack up a to go plate from your meal and bring to a neighbor that turned down your invitation, but you know would enjoy some food and 20 minutes of your time that day?

If you are not home alone this year, how will you make sure others don't feel that way either? Involve your kids, make it a family tradition. Build a connection with someone locally that doesn't have the same blessing you do. Then foster that relationship all year long.

Don't know anyone like this? Then go shopping for a new friend. Every time you are out, be on the lookout. Start conversations with everyone at the store, at work, the gas pump, etc. And pray. God will lead you to them. Don't let Christmas be a time you retreat to your clan. Let it be a time that you branch out and make new friends.

Community Help Center



Did you know that Hartsville has a help center? And we do all we can to help them help the community. They are open Monday through Thursday and operate a thrift store that runs off of your donations. You donate gently used items, they sell them at thrift store prices, and use the funds to help people in emergency situations and to provide food boxes for families and need weekly.

They also need your canned food donations too! The more they have, the more they can give away. In the narthex is a brown basket. Bring canned goods every week and place them in the basket. We will make sure they get to the right place. You can also volunteer and donate your time. Just stop in one day and talk to them.
