A Word from Pastor Tim:

"Teach us to number our days that we may gain a heart of wisdom." Psalm 90:12

Have you ever noticed that some of the most powerful truths you will ever learn in this life will be taught to you by your pets? This is strange considering their intellect and ability to think it's so small compared to our own. But yet, we all know it to be true.

Some of you have heard me talk about my dog Snowball. He is our 14-year-old Malti Zhu. Of course, he is blind, as we have had his eyeballs removed. His teeth are also falling out, his leg pops out of socket sometimes, if he's not deaf, he's close to it, he's gotten really skinny and can't seem to eat enough to gain any weight, and now he's in the early stages of kidney failure.

Poor thing. The average life expectancy of a dog of his breed is 12 to 14 years. We passed the 14-year mark back in May and are rapidly approaching 15. That means we know he is living on borrowed time. He does nothing anymore, but sleep. And his favorite place to sleep is in my lap. Sometimes he's in my way and I have other stuff to do. In the middle of the night, he sleeps in the bed with us and likes to snuggle. But I need to roll over or get comfortable and he's just in the way. Sometimes it can be frustrating or annoying. But then I decided to start a new practice.

Every time I get the opportunity to pet him and show him love, I treat it as though it is the last time I will get that opportunity. This way, when he does pass, I can be confident that I have treated him the best way possible. How upset would I be if when he passes, I realize that every time he came to me for connection, I was just annoyed and aggravated? This has been my practice for the last month or two because "he could die any day now."

But what about Staci? What about my kids? What about my friends? They could all die today or any day. But I don't treat every encounter with them as though it is my last opportunity to show them my love for them. But it might very well be my last opportunity. I had this realization while petting snowball a few weeks ago. And I realized that it is not only good logic, but also logic that needs to be applied to every

relationship of mine. I admit, I am slower in this application than I was with my dog. But I am trying to see every encounter for what it really is, potentially the last opportunity I will have to communicate love to a person.

Will I ever perfect this behavior? No. But imagine what an impact it will have on all my relationships just by improving in this. Now, imagine how it would impact your relationships if you were to give conscious effort to improving in this area.

Recipe Corner

Eggplant Parmigiana By Linda McDonald

3 tlbsp melted butter ½ c cornflake crumbs ¼ c grated Parmesan ½ tsp Salt
Dash of pepper 1 small eggplant

One egg, slightly beaten 8oz canned tomato sauce 1/2 teaspoon oregano 1/2 teaspoon sugar Dash of onion salt 2 slices, mozz. cheese, cut in half diagonally

Pour melted butter in a 10 x 8 baking dish and set aside. Combine corn flakes, Parmesan cheese, salt, pepper, and set aside. Peel eggplant and cut into 3/4 inch slices. Dip slices in the egg and coat with the crumb mixture. Arrange in baking dish. Bake at 400 for 20 minutes, flip slices and bake another 15 minutes.

Combine the tomato sauce, oregano, sugar, and onion salt in a small pan. Bring to boil. Pour over the eggplant. Top with mozzarella. Bake an additional three minutes or until cheese is melted.
