A Word from Pastor Tim:

Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I; send me!" And he said, "Go and say to this people: 'Keep listening, but do not comprehend; keep looking, but do not understand.' Make the mind of this people dull, and stop their ears, and shut their eyes, so that they may not look with their eyes and listen with their ears and comprehend with their minds and turn and be healed." Then I said, "How long, O Lord?" And he said, "Until cities lie waste without inhabitant, and houses without people, and the land is utterly desolate; until the Lord sends everyone far away, and vast is the emptiness in the midst of the land. Even if tenth part remain in it, it will be burned again, like a terebinth or an oak whose stump remains standing when it is felled." Isaiah 6:8-13

I have always loved this scripture. It is strangely comforting, and yet offensive at the same time. A dear friend of mine, senior pastor at Fulton 1st UMC, Susan Carrigan, recently shared with me these words after spending some time with this text. It is something that spoke to me this past month. So, I wanted to share it with you in hopes that it might speak to you as well. Here are her thoughts:

The holy seed is its stump.

I have been living with these words for the last week. I have always quit after "Here I am, send me!" I haven't spent much time looking at the mission. It isn't a fun mission. Having also just finished large chunks of Judges, I realize that while we love the seasons of new life, birth, and creation, there are seasons where God tears down to rebuild. When we become people who "continue to do evil in the eyes of the Lord" a fresh start seems to be coming. The holy seed is always ready for new life to begin again, but for a while, it seems to get our hearts aligned with His, he has allowed a "winter" to make way for the coming spring.

Wait, I hear you all say, that's Old Testament, God isn't like that anymore. I am going to beg to differ. God is the same yesterday, today, and tomorrow. We use far different words to express a similar process, but the history of the Church proves that there is a tearing down and a rebuilding process that happens over and over again. Does that mean God stops loving the Church and withdraws? I don't think so. I do think we have seasons where we see a change of direction, perhaps even the death of some systems we have grown to love and find comfort in. Perhaps that's the season we are in now. If so, my prayer is that God will complete the good work begun and bring us to a place where our worship is acceptable and our hearts, mission, and minds are aligned with His.

As I was using a Wednesday afternoon to sit on the porch and look out upon things and ponder, I heard a crow caw. Actually, there were two crows. They were flying back and forth across the yard from one tree to another, all the while talking. I remembered nice summer afternoons on the Wabash sitting with my grandfather and the crows were always busy talking. He would translate their crow language to me. Most of the time the crows were helping me solve any little problems going on or answering my little girl questions, or they would tell me short stories. Sometimes they sang sea chanteys. They were always quite entertaining and taught me lots of things to use in life. Those crows taught me that my Pop-pa was very loving, thoughtful and wise.

I really appreciate my memories as I grow older. They fill up a lot of time that might necessarily be lonely. Sometimes they rock me to sleep, so to speak. It is good time spent sitting and remembering people, places and things of what seems long ago. My Pop-pa taught me to entertain myself by looking at the clouds and seeing the faces, animals and other things that take shape in them. He taught me history of the late 19th Century and over half of the 20th Century, because he lived it. I realized through him to love and respect animals in nature because they are so natural, and it is such an honor to observe their instincts and way of life, and the way they adapt when we change their way of life. I learned instincts are what is needed in this life. I learned a lot from the animals of God's nature as a child. The rest I learned from watching DANIEL BOONE.

Pop-pa always professed that he was not a believer, but beauty, kindness, love and skill came from his abilities, and those talents and traits are instilled in us by God. His stubbornness about not believing could not stand up under his realization of his need. For I heard him early one morning crying and praying at the kitchen table for his wife who was very ill. God breaks through stubbornness and other barriers we think are us, but God knows us better than we know ourselves, and He shows us that at different times in our lives. After the death of his wife, we both did our best without her. He sent me to church every Sunday for as long as I would let him. He kept as many church ladies in my life as was possible for all kinds of things. Again, I would hear him pray at different times for me and for his ability to raise me up by himself. I thank God for him and my memories. Happy birthday, Pop-pa.
